Community, Respect and Equality Champions Pilot	Chrysalis Support Services will select 25 community champions to promote pro-social messages about family and domestic violence in Geraldton, Dongara and Mullewa. Community champions will be visible, approachable and will attend community awareness events and activities.	\$23,903
City of Albany	Strike II Youth Drop in Program	The City of Albany will provide a Friday night drop in program that provides a safe supervised space for at-risk youth aged 10 to 17 years. This program presently attracts up to 120 young people per night; 50% who are Aboriginal with the majority from low socio economic and high risk families.	\$25,000
City of Busselton	R Culture	The City of Busselton will provide a youth program at the Busselton Youth Precinct and Skate Park (BYP) that focuses on engagement, ownership and respect. R Culture will be delivered on Friday nights and each session will have a physical engagement activity and one of the seven 'Choose Respect' codes of behaviour themes.	\$11,450
City of Canning	Nomad Project - Canning	The City of Canning will work with key service providers in the Gosnells and Canning Youth Collaboration Action Network (YCAN). The Nomad Project will deliver mentoring, youth activities, events and support over school holiday periods and other identified times when antisocial behaviour is more prevalent.	\$25,000
City of Gosnells	Nomad Project - Gosnells	The City of Gosnells will work with key service providers in the Gosnells and Canning Youth Collaboration Action Network (YCAN), Gosnells and Canning Vale Police Stations to deliver the Nomad Project. It will consist of mentoring, youth activities, events and support over the school holiday periods and other identified times when antisocial behaviour is more prevalent.	\$25,000
City of Greater Geraldton	Dismantle Bike Rescue Training Project	The City of Greater Geraldton will engage young people from Geraldton and Mullewa in a bike rescue program as early intervention to prevent at-risk young people engaging in criminal activity. The Dismantle Bike Rescue Training Project provides training on how to restore a bicycle and boosts self-esteem and self-worth among the participants, while providing tangible skills in a supportive and safe environment.	\$25,000
City of Perth	CPTED Guidelines	City of Perth will update their Safer Design Guidelines by engaging a Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) consultant to review their current Safer by Design Guidelines (2004). The review will include latest CPTED research and evaluation and apply this to the environments in the city and suburban environment.	\$25,000
Edmund Rice Centre Mirrabooka Inc.	Local Parks Youth Engagement Soccer Project	The Edmund Rice Centre Mirrabooka will provide weekly soccer and mentoring sessions to young males and females aged 8 to 18 years living in Koondoola and surrounding areas. The program will provide opportunities including matches with local community and club teams, leadership development, coaching and a healthy lifestyles component in order to promote community harmony and reduce antisocial behaviour.	\$25,000
Enterprise Learning Projects	Kalumburu Cultural Enterprise Camp	Enterprise Learning Projects exists to foster the economic empowerment of remote Aboriginal communities. This project will co-design and implement an on country skill development camp and workshop series with the Kalumburu community with the aim to reconnect at risk youth with traditional cultural practices in an effort to prevent crime and antisocial behaviour in the community. The project will identify at-risk youth and community members in consultation with key elders, Kalumburu Police, Kalumburu Aboriginal Corporation and Kalumburu School.	\$25,000
Fauna Rehabilitation Foundation	Native Animal Rescue River Connections program	Fauna Rehabilitation Foundation will engage at-risk youth and young offenders in a program to protect and conserve local habitats and native wildlife via the Native Animals Rescue (NAR) River Connections program. The program will provide opportunities for young people referred by WA Police Youth Crime Intervention Officers and Youth Justice teams to develop skills and improve their emotional temperament and self-esteem while also providing benefit to the community and environment.	\$24,796
Geraldton Streetwork Aboriginal Corporation	Youth Connection Holiday Program	Geraldton Streetwork Aboriginal Corporation will provide school holiday programs for Aboriginal young people aged six to fifteen years in the Rangeway, Utakarra and Karloo areas. The Youth Connection Holiday Program will provide fun activities in a safe and nurturing environment, as well as family engagement opportunities. It will provide cultural learning, protective behaviours, healthy relationships, drug awareness information, healthy cooking activities and police engagement activities along with transport to pick up and drop off participants.	\$23,250
Injury Control Council of Western Australia	A Way Through - Aboriginal Healing Project	The Injury Control Council of WA will employ the organisation Wisdom in Your Life to deliver an Aboriginal healing program in the Wheatbelt area that is culturally safe and accessible. The program will be delivered through a series of community-centred facilitated group sessions and workshops, which provide a range of self-care, resilient building tools designed to heal grief and loss, and prevent further trauma such as suicide or re-offending.	\$24,895
Jobs South West Inc.	Change of Directions	Jobs South West will deliver a diversionary program in Mandurah to engage twelve disengaged young people involved in criminal activities, antisocial behaviours and truancy. Police and Juvenile Justice Officers will identify and refer the young people to the program.	\$24,434

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Kununurra Community Garden Inc.	Cultivating Kids Kununurra	Kununurra Community Garden will engage with local Aboriginal community members and service providers to conduct educational workshops for youth in school holidays. Cultivating Kids Kununurra will consist of workshops and short day trips to support the re-engagement of young people with growing their own food, bush foods and medicines, gardening skills and cultural practices to encourage self-responsibility and empowerment.	\$20,000
Kununurra Waringarri Aboriginal Corporation	Waringarri Kids and Youth Climbing the Social Ladder	Kununurra Waringarri Aboriginal Corporation will organise and deliver a series of weekly activities for children and youth in Kununurra and surrounding areas with the aim of engaging and connecting to provide assistance and support, as well as preventing and responding to antisocial behaviour. The Waringarri Kids and Youth Climbing the Social Ladder project focuses on team building activities and developing social skills, which are educational but also fun, all-inclusive and safe for participants.	\$25,000
Learning and Attentional Disorders Society of WA Inc.	Responsible Parenting: Responsive Children	The Learning and Attentional Disorders Society of WA (LADS) will provide evidence-based early intervention workshops to parents of children with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). Workshops will teach parents a range of techniques to assist in the behavioural management of ADHD children. Evidence suggests that children who exhibit severe behaviour problems from an early age are disproportionately likely to develop into severely antisocial adolescents and adults. UK statistics show that 21% of incarcerated adults and 45% of juvenile offenders have diagnosed ADHD.	\$20,700
Local Drug Action Groups Incorporated - Geraldton	Health and Wellbeing Forum	Local Drug Action Groups (LDAG) in Geraldton and School Drug Education and Road Aware will deliver resilience and drug education for year five and six students in Geraldton and local communities. WA Police funded the first stage of this project and this application is to continue delivering the project to more students attending schools in Geraldton. The Health and Wellbeing Forum will benefit approximately 750 students. The forums will complement existing school programs and raise student awareness of the harm that alcohol and drug use may cause to themselves, their family and the community.	\$22,281
Local Drug Action Groups Incorporated - Northam	Northam Resilience and Well Being Expo	The Local Drug Action Groups in Northam will implement a youth engagement program aimed at empowering young people and motivating them towards good decision making, goal setting, and respecting their community. This project will raise awareness to youth within the Shire of Northam about the impact of using drugs and alcohol. The Northam Resilience and Well Being Expo is a one day forum focusing on resilience skills, education, and mental health, followed by another classroom program which affirms and builds on the knowledge gained at the forum.	\$15,300
Local Drug Action Groups Incorporated - Fremantle	ARTreach	Local Drug Action Groups Incorporated will run a pop up art studio each week for 30 weeks in the Fremantle Central Business District. The art studio will be set up at spaces identified as crime hot spots for antisocial behaviour and will change from week to week. ARTreach involves outreach workers sitting with vulnerable people in popular parks within the Fremantle area and inviting them to share their story.	\$16,034
Mercy Community Services Incorporated	1-ARoo Boxing Program	Mercy Community Services will deliver an early intervention boxing based exercise program to engage at-risk young people in the Wanneroo area, to reduce offending and antisocial behaviour. MercyCare, Reconnect, WA Police, and the City of Wanneroo identified the need for diversionary activities like this due to rising levels of antisocial behaviour in Wanneroo. 1-ARoo Boxing sessions will be delivered after school and involve fitness, boxing skills, strategies to manage emotions and appropriate social behaviour, healthy living and life skills including how to seek help effectively.	\$24,910
Mission Australia	Hip-Hopportunities for Young People	Mission Australia's Drug and Alcohol Youth Services, Youth Beat and Youth Accommodation Support Service will collaborate to deliver a structured Hip-Hop music program in Perth for young people aged 16 to 21 years who are considered at-risk and whom experience varying degrees of social, emotional and financial disadvantage. The Hip-Hopportunities for Young People program will facilitate real life experiences of the music industry, with a view to future employment and training opportunities.	\$16,047
Ngalla Maya Aboriginal Corporation	First Nations Homelessness and Advocacy Project	Ngalla Maya Aboriginal Corporation works towards preventing house evictions and preventing child removals. They work in partnership with self-refereed at-risk families as well as with Department of Housing and Department for Child Protection. The First Nations Homelessness and Advocacy Project (FNHAP) aims to keep families housed, children in school and families together and reduce the risk of child removal and protection. Counselling and support will be provided to families to address issues that would otherwise lead to homelessness, public disorder, antisocial behaviour, offending, and incarceration.	\$25,000

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Ngalla Maya Aboriginal Corporation	Youth Engagement Project	Ngalla Maya Aboriginal Corporation supports former inmates into wellbeing, hope, literacy and numeracy, and training and education programs, as well as into employment post-release from prison. The Youth Engagement Project will develop relationships between at-risk youth and mentors, and excursions will be used as a way to build relationships and enable at-risk youth to be mentored on a culturally appropriate level by older members of their own community.	\$25,000
Ngnowar Aerwah Aboriginal Corporation	Empowering our Youth	Ngnowar Aerwah Aboriginal Corporation support Aboriginal people and families who are affected by substance abuse and provide programs where young people can learn skills and build confidence in environments which are both safe and stimulating. The Empowering Our Youth program will target 20 disengaged young people living in Wyndham and build their motivation, respect and instil community pride to enable them to contribute to building a healthy community.	\$25,000
Northern Suburbs Community Legal Centre Inc.	Stop the Drugs: Stop the Violence	Northern Suburbs Community Legal Centre will produce an educational video and implement a mentoring project for Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CaLD) youth. The aim of the program is to address criminogenic needs facing CaLD youth, specifically targeting drugs and alcohol. Stop the Drugs: Stop the Violence will involve a student working group who will produce various segment topics as part of the educational video.	\$23,473
Pakistanis in Australia Inc.	Crime Prevention through Sports and Dialogue	Pakistanis in Australia will organise three community events to provide opportunities for the community to directly interact with WA Police Officers. Each event will directly involve members of WA Police with the intent to break down any barriers between the two groups and promote information exchange on pertinent issues such as improving safety of young people, drug and alcohol related crimes and reducing domestic violence.	\$3,075
Regional Development Australia Pilbara Incorporated	Boss Hogg Boxing and Fitness Academy	Regional Development Australia Pilbara Incorporated in partnership with Boss Hogg Boxing and Fitness Academy will deliver a boxing and healthy lifestyle program to young Aboriginal people in Karratha. The program will focus on mentoring, personal development and life skills, drug and alcohol awareness, nutrition and building self-esteem and cultural awareness.	\$23,407
Save the Children Australia	It Takes A Town	Save the Children Australia will deliver activities during each of the four school holiday periods in 2017, targeting young people at high risk of engaging in offending in Kununurra and surrounding areas. The project will link with existing Save the Children case management programs to ensure young people are engaged throughout the school holidays.	\$25,000
Shire of Kulin	Camp Kulin Outreach Program	The Shire of Kulin will use the Camp Kulin Outreach Program to provide after school and weekend programming to engage approximately 80 children and young people in the towns of Kulin and Corrigin. This program will teach basic life skills such as leadership, respect, trust, self-confidence, self-esteem, perseverance, emotional regulation and anger management through activities that are fun and engaging. This is a joint application between the Shire of Kulin and the Shire of Corrigin and has been developed following a recent increase in vandalism and graffiti around both towns.	\$18,952
Shire of Nannup	Respect 6275	The Shire of Nannup will establish a 12 month youth program that provides ownership and skills to young people. This program is in response to a significant increase in property offences and burglary offences involving young people. Respect 6275 will engage young people to design a mountain bike pump track. Young people will then work alongside community members to construct the track. Young people will also participate in a mentoring program throughout the year and a camp will be hosted at the conclusion of the project.	\$25,000
Shire of Northam	Night Hoops Youth Engagement Project	The Shire of Northam will implement the Night Hoops Youth Engagement Project, which is an existing inclusion, diversion and engagement program that uses basketball as a means to reach young people in need. The program does not specifically target Aboriginal youth however it is expected that more than 80% of the participants will be Aboriginal. Night Hoops Youth Engagement Project will consist of two, six week basketball tournaments on Saturday nights. Participants will be collected by bus and delivered to the facility to participate in the program then transported back home.	\$20,106
Sowilo Community Inc.	Don't Break Doors Go Out Doors	Sowilo Community High School in Kelmscott caters to young people aged 12 to 20 years who struggle to succeed in a mainstream school. Many of the Sowilo students face the potential to offend based upon the trauma and social interactions they experience. The Don't Break Doors Go Out Doors program is a three day hiking trip in Jarrahdale State Forrest focused around camping and survival based activities. Under the guidance of a senior social worker, participants will be taught strategies to deal with different life stressors and specific self-soothing techniques as an alternative to the use of drug and alcohol use.	\$2,330

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The Federation of PCYC Inc. (Collie)	Street Gym	Collie PCYC will provide after school activities to engage at-risk youth in positive and challenging pursuits. The aim of this program is to create a fun, structured environment by implementing a PARKOUR style Street Gym three days per week including on Friday evenings when crime and antisocial behaviour in the Collie region is more prevalent.	\$25,000
The Federation PCYC Inc. (Kensington)	Drive To The Future	PCYC Kensington will re-commence the Drive to the Future program giving eight participants the opportunity to gain their motor vehicle driver's license. Participants will be supported by WA Police Youth Crime Intervention Officers to complete the theory component and then will gain road experience with a qualified driving instructor in the centre's dual control vehicle. The eight participants will complete the theory component of the Keys for Life program currently offered to high school students but as the majority of these participants possibly did not attend high school, they would not have had this opportunity to participate in this program.	\$22,593
The Nintirri Centre Incorporated	Tom Price and Surrounds Alcohol Prevention Project	The Nintirri Centre will implement a range of advocacy strategies around identified alcohol-related issues in Tom Price, Paraburdoo, Wakathuni and Bellary Springs. An inter-agency working group called the Alcohol and Other Drug Management Group have established a strategic plan that incorporates supply demand and harm reduction strategies. The Tom Price and Surrounds Alcohol Prevention Project will develop and distribute localised resources to raise awareness and generate community discussion on alcohol-related family violence and the culture of alcohol consumption in the communities.	\$16,506
The Wirrpanda Foundation Limited	Deadly Brotha Boyz	The Wirrpanda Foundation will run a culturally appropriate healthy lifestyles program aimed at educating and engaging at-risk or disadvantaged Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander boys residing in the Great Southern region of Western Australia. The Deadly Brotha Boyz (DBB) program will employ two local male Aboriginal role models who will liaise with schools to discuss program activity needs of participants. A cultural camp will be held as an incentive for program participants with regular school and DBB program attendance.	\$25,000
West Australian Football Commission	Peel Youth Engagement Project	The West Australian Football Commission (WAFC) will use sports activities to engage at-risk youth. These activities, followed by an offer of support services and pathways to positive lifestyles is a proven effective program strategy to reduce antisocial behaviour, re-offending and drug/alcohol use. The Peel Youth Engagement (PYE) project will consist of a series of activities aimed at engaging participants, encouraging positive behaviours and providing direct links to social support services.	\$25,000
